

Impact of Sports Premium Spending Report 2019-2020

William Barcroft Junior School received £18,970 Sports Premium Funding in the academic year 2019-2020. There was also a £2539.39 from the previous year.

Context of School

William Barcroft Junior School serves one of the most deprived wards in Cleethorpes/ Grimsby. **There are around 314 pupils on roll.** Many pupils come from disadvantaged economic home circumstances. The school's deprivation indicator is significantly above the national average. There is a high proportion of pupils joining and leaving the school at non-standard admission times.

Provision:

Our priorities at William Barcroft Junior School are:

- To ensure that all children have access to high quality sports teaching in a range of sports, taught in blocks to raise attainment.
- To give opportunities for children to be involved in competitive sport.
- To raise the profile of sports in school and to encourage healthy lifestyles for the children through sports participation.
- To give the children access to high-quality, appropriate sporting equipment, to give positive experiences of the sport they are taught.
- To offer and encourage the children the opportunity to attend out-of-school hours sports clubs and opportunities.

School Sports Partnership - Membership to the North East Lincolnshire School Sports Partnership.	£1650	Joining the school sports partnership allowed the school access to high-quality support from specialist, sports-dedicated service. This offered entry to a range of competitions, and access to CPD opportunities for the staff, e.g. indoor PE curriculum training by the staff in December. The service has also worked with year 5

		children to create sports media leaders in Autumn term, and offered distinct networking opportunities with other schools. SSP also supported us in retaining our Gold Award.
Pivotal Skills An external company hired for the purpose of CPD , training staff in delivery of high quality PE and PE clubs.	£17,632	All teachers worked alongside a specialist coach to deliver clubs to children coving a range of sports. This has lead the upskilling of teachers in the delivery of PE. Children have benefitted from a wider range of clubs and high quality sports coaching.
Swimming Sessions A course of catch up sessions for year 6 pupils who did not reach the national standard in year 4.	£0	Unfortunately this was unable to go ahead due to the Covid -19 situation and school closures.
Equipment Parachute, skipping ropes, beach balls, goal balls, tape measures, blindfolds, foam balls, footballs, hockey balls and super bounce tennis balls were all purchased to enhance delivery of the PE curriculum.	£351.26 £91.59	The equipment meant that the pupils could have individual equipment rather than sharing. They could access a wider range of sports than previously offered. Children also developed an awareness of living with disabilities and how sport could increase self-confidence and self-esteem.
Golf Club An after school extra-curricular club to offer a wider range of sports.	£390	A golf specialist was hired to offer an after-school golf club to the children. This was over-subscribed, and allowed the children the chance to experience a sport many had previously had no access to, and which was supplementary to the curriculum.
Bikeability A course to give year 5 pupils the life skill of riding a bike safely on the roads.	£0	This had to be cancelled due to Covid-19, however it has been booked in as a catch up in Autumn term Y6.
Travel Expenses A bus to the local cross country competition, plus transport to badminton and basketball competitions were needed to enable children to access competitive sport.	£85.80 + £170	A large number of pupils were able to access competitive sport.
